Mission Statement

St. Pius X Parish is a community of Roman Catholics established in 1954 within the Church of Fall River to collaborate with its Bishop. Nourished through Word and Sacrament, we attend to the Holy Spirit and follow our Lord, Christ Jesus. We give witness to our participation in the Body of Christ by welcoming, evangelizing and serving all whom we encounter especially the poor.

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The Face of the Parish

St. Pius X Parish is a community of approximately 2,500 households. The face of this parish resides in the Parish Office. Here, the welcoming, efficient, and always ready to help solve incoming concerns, are

the tireless ladies that embody the spirit of this living institution. Years ago, this office originated with one housekeeper living in an apartment attached to the Rectory in what has now transformed to become a dynamic and very busy office space.

Parishioners of St. Pius X Church can, and do, access the Parish office Monday through Friday. The staff members of the Parish Office field the very diverse requests submitted

to the office. The call volume remains relatively constant on a daily basis, they maintain all parish sacramental records, coordinate the calendars for the Church. Parish Life Center and Faith Formation building. They arrange for anniversary and memorial Masses, forwarding requests for Sacrament of the Sick, arrange for the publication and distribution of the weekly bulletin, submit revenue reporting as appropriate, and more. In addition, they seamlessly cover for unforeseen events such as funerals and, on occasion, an unexpected and very urgent plea for support for housing, food, etc.

A recent example of an unforeseen trag-

edy affecting this community was the death of Sergeant Sean Gannon. The Parish Office assisted in coordinating untold details, providing communication, and responding to inquiries from the media and concerned parishioners.

Daily inquiries come in with interest from around the Cape on topics ranging from the origin of religious traditions, to individuals seeking religious

asylum, to community outreach requests. They coordinate scheduling details for, on average, over 100 funerals, 20 weddings and 40 baptisms annually.

Please meet the staff of the Parish Office:

• Lorraine A. Cambra is a familiar face having been a part of this parish for over forty years. She began volun-

teering as a secretary with the Religious Education program, and then began supporting the Parish Office as a volunteer 5 days a week until becoming part of the paid staff as the Business Office Manager. She truly qualifies as the parish historian with a remarkable memory she can easily recall events when working with Fr. Broderick through Fr. George Bellenoit up to today's current events. Lorraine was born and raised in Provincetown, she married her late husband of 65 years, Bob a respected plumber, and moved to Yarmouth in 1968. Her son, Reverend Daniel Joseph Cambra, M.I.C., is presently residing at Divine Mercy Shrine in Stockbridge, MA. She happily recalled the story of Monsignor Smith's determi-

nation to build the Shrine to Mary on the parish grounds bringing a beautiful and peaceful space to our campus. Lorraine is a Eucharistic Minister and Lector. The Catholic School Difference – "Catholic Schools Rule"

Considering the recent disheartening media revelations of clergy scandals and the normal lack of news coverage of everyday good works by clergy, nuns, deacons, educators and laity, faithful around the globe, I was surprised by a positive editorial from an unlikely source, The Wall Street Journal June, 2018 with the headline "The Catholic School Difference."

The editorial cited a new academic study by the University of California-Santa Barbara sponsored by the Thomas B. Fordham Institute, confirming what Catholic elementary teachers have known and emphasized since the parochial school system was established in 1782, that you could instill

self-discipline in students, a virtue that will help them in their studies and later in life.

The authors who found statistical evidence that students in catholic schools exhibited less disruptive behavior than their counterparts in other public and private schools, reached three conclusions:

- Schools that value and focus on self-discipline will likely do a better job of fostering it in children.
- Other schools might consider both explicit and implicit methods to replicate the "Catholic Schools Effect."
- Don't underestimate the power of religion to positively influence a child's behavior.

The authors offer no easy prescription for the other schools to achieve the self-discipline effect of Catholic schools and lament "it is a tragedy for the nation" that so may Catholic schools continue to close when they are most needed. Their lessons are worth preserving.

The parochial school system in the United States had uninterrupted growth for 183 years with enrollment coming from newly arriving Irish, Polish and German immigrants. Peaking in the 1960's with over 13,000 schools and 5.6 million students, it accounted for about 90% of the private enrollment in the U.S.

Following the social revolution of the late 60's and 70's, there has been a steady decline to approximately 6,500 schools and 2 million students in 2016 with much different demographics.

While public schools tend to differ through academic offerings such as language immersion of magnet programs, Catholic schools typically give equal priority to academic and non-academic development, integrating "Gospel Values" such as piety, character and self-discipline as well as teaching service oriented values e.g. civic duty, volunteerism and compassion for those in need.

To the last point of compassion, I can remember vividly my first day of first grade at St. Francis Xavier in Roslindale in September 1940 when Sister began class by giving everyone in the class a "Mite" box. She then explained that a famine was taking place far away in China but if we could save some pennies from visits to the candy store and fill the box, which held close to \$5 worth of pennies, it would buy enough rice to

feed one child for one year. Twenty-nine years later in 1969 upon returning to Washing to, D.C. from Navy duty in Japan and the Pacific, I discovered my local Chinese-American auto mechanic in Maryland was one of the millions of Chinese trying to find food in the late 1930's & 40's. Forty-nine years later we still meet and enjoy a Chinese buffet together.

We are blessed to have our own vibrant parish school, *St. Pius X School*, which focuses on the development of each student's

self-discipline through: spiritual engagement, a rigorous academic program, and opportunities in the arts and in athletics. We form students who will become citizen-disciples, participating in and contributing to society and the church. The school focuses on our role to serve and provide service to others, whether it's the parish, the local community or a more global initiative. The school's mission, "to learn the Catholic faith and follow in the footsteps of Jesus Christ, to grow spiritually, academically and socially and to lead a life of faith, service and integrity" expresses who we are and what do. The commitment to Catholic education, evidenced in our families, continues after *St. Pius X School*, as many of our students attend St. John Paul II for high school and Catholic colleges or universities.

Hope for

Hard Times

Scott Hahn

Hope for Hard Times by Scott Hahn is a small book with a big impact. This book has eight short chapters which are perfect for daily or weekly meditation. Each paragraph below is headed by a chapter name and Hahn's "Take Away" which concludes that chapter.

1. Is this how you treat your friends? Saints and Scriptures teach us that hardship need not make us unhappy.

All of God's friends undergo trials and tribulations, but they live in the hope of love. We are all willing to sacrifice and endure difficulties for earthly love, and, as God's children, we are given hope to attain eternal, divine love.

2. What are we waiting for? Our greatest need is for a love that satisfies. Only God's love satisfies.

Hahn says "God sometimes gives us what we want so that we'll learn to trust him to give us what we **need**." Our true hope is for the Kingdom of God.

3. How our Father loves God's discipline is proof of his fatherly love.

We must realize that what feels good to us is not what is actually good for us. God treats and disciplines us as a loving parent would treat a child. Our faith enables us to accept God's authority. Hope enables us to trust his word and his abiding care. Our faith leads us to hope.

4. Testing our faith All love requires sacrifice.

We must all lose people we love. We know that with our brains, though our hearts may not keep up with our brains on this side of the grave. We are tested so we become more aware of needing God's strength.

5. Complaining to God It's OK to complain to God. He can take it.

We should not complain about God like the Israelites grumbled in the wilderness. However, when we complain

to God, we assume God really cares about us. We have faith and hope in him.

6. Power made perfect

God's power is most evident in our moments of weakness.

As Jesus said, "Not my will, but yours, be done." Put God's plan for you ahead of your own. Do not take pride in your own accomplishments, but give credit to God for his gifts.

"God empowers us ... through our weakness and brokenness." Our suffering leads to endurance which leads to character and then to hope.

7. The Escape Room

The sacraments provide our way of escape through troubles.

Jesus suffered as our representative not as our substitute. Suffering was part of Jesus' mission, just as it is part of ours. If there is no suffering, there can be no glory. However, we need help to endure suffering, and we are never tempted beyond our strength. Through the sacraments, God helps us unite with Jesus' suffering.

8. The touch of the Cross Our sufferings have dignity because

they are crosses, and they are Christ's.

Christ gave our pain and suffering a holy significance when he died on the cross. We become fully human when we unite our problems with Christ's suffering. If sorrows are our cross, they are instruments of our salvation. Make your sorrows holy by blessing them with a Sign of the Cross.

I highly recommend *Hope for the Hard Times* for reading at any time. But I recommend it even more stongly when someone needs a little extra boost during a tough time. We have one copy in the St. Pius X Library, among the books recently donated from the estate of Dr. Wilfred Clouthier, MD. It is also available online at Amazon, Barnes and Noble, and eBay.

Pilgrimage and Grace

Many years ago, I found myself on a pilgrimage to a Marian Shrine in the former Yugoslavia.

My pastor, and friend, Fr. Forrest Rouelle, asked me to bring a guitar and that he would bring the music for our group. After we arrived, we realized he had forgotten to pack the music sheets. No worries, for I then prayed that the Holy Spirit would guide me along as I played. As others settled in, I decided to climb up a mountain path to where there was a large cross. I brought my guitar and sang praise and worship songs there.

Also on the top of the mountain, was a woman who was picking up litter on the path that was left behind by other pilgrims. In a brief conversation, I asked her why she was there, and she told me "The Father called me to be here." She also said she was a nurse and was discerning her vocation and whether she should join Mother Teresa's order.

As I walked back down the mountain, I thought about how the woman, I met, had referred to "*The Father*." At Mass that night, I would lead everyone in singing "*Abba Father*," as everyone would know the words. As the week went on I was not feeling well and lagged behind the rest of the pilgrims and basically spent a lot of time on my own. At every turn and in almost every conversation, I heard the

"Father" mentioned. I asked Fr. Rouelle about the many references to *The Father* and he said to me that "You know and love Jesus and you listen to the Holy Spirit. I think you believe *God the Father* is far away and that someday Jesus and the Spirit will help you find *The Father* in heaven." He was right. He then went on to tell me that everyone on a pilgrimage receives some form of grace. In this case, he said Mary is full of grace to the overflowing and that this grace is not her own but from God. I needed to know that God the Father was close and not far away. *I needed a relation-ship with Him and that Mary knew that*. It was one of the unique graces that I received on that pilgrimage.

I also experienced many things that no one else in my group experienced. I heard and saw signs of hatred, even Nazi memorabilia in a shop that sold Rosaries. I saw a new church that was covered in Nazi graffiti and gutted.

Christians were referred to as "those people" by Muslims. Muslims were referred to as "those people" by Christians. I saw a lot of broken windows on back streets. I visited a Mosque in Mostar and stood on a bridge that they called "Peace" that had survived Turkish invasions, Napoleon's army cannon, and two world wars. (It did not survive the war that was about to start.) I never felt scared, but before our group left, we were brought to Belgrade and saw tanks in the streets. We were kept there five days more without explanation. Later I found out that all the Americans were


being sent home together on a flight on Yugoslavian Airlines. The country was bankrupt and could not afford fuel for planes as they were about to start a civil war. (It is also interesting that I was behind the "Iron Curtain" the week the U. S. started the first Gulf War, and that I saw communist propaganda on TV, but that is a different story.)

Another very special "grace" I received was that an older woman on the trip confided to me out of the blue that she was praying that I would meet my "gentle bride". This was the prayer of my heart. Not long after that trip I met Nancy at another Marian Shrine on a retreat. We immediately began to do fundraising concerts for victims of the war in Yugoslavia. Nancy and I performed a concert at the Cathedral in Providence R. I. that was

sponsored by Bishop Gelineau to raise funds for refugees. We then toured the United Kingdom twice, raising funds for a group called "Center for Peace" in London. They brought medical supplies directly to Muslim and Christian refugees that could not be reached by the Red Cross and other agencies. We met very brave and compassionate people. We met refugees who were taking refuge in England. We found that the people in England had great empathy for the victims of Sarajevo, as they remembered that their own cities were bombed and destroyed by Nazi bombers.

This other "grace" I received was to have walked on the roads of Yugoslavia and to hear the words of hatred and fear so that I could, with Nancy, respond to the need there.


St. Pius X Youth Ministry
